## Topic in Focus: The Afghan Cabinet

- The Afghan Cabinet is the **main policy and administrative government body** in Afghanistan.
- The constitution gives the **Lower House of the Afghan National Assembly** – a bicameral legislature – considerable power over Cabinet appointments.
- Cabinet nominees must present themselves to the Lower House (Wolesi Jirga) for **approval by secret ballot**.
- One of the most significant issues remains **balancing the Cabinet's composition** to reflect the ethnic diversity of Afghanistan.
- The complete Afghan Cabinet will consist of 25 Ministers who will head **25 separate government portfolios**.

## Mark the Date

The Afghan National Assembly / Parliament will vote on the Cabinet nominations on 2 Jan 2009.

## Who's Who: Hamid Karzai

- Hamid Karzai was born on December 24, 1957. **Both his grandfather and father held significant political positions.**
- He served as Director of Information for the National Liberation Front led by Professor Sebghatullah Mujadidi. He later became the Deputy Director of its Political Office.
- When the Mujahideen Government was established in Kabul in 1992, he was appointed as **its Deputy Foreign Minister**.
- His role as leader of Afghanistan was confirmed by members of the Emergency Loya Jirga when he was **elected President of the Transitional Government on June 13, 2002**. In Afghanistan's first presidential election on October 9, 2004, Hamid Karzai won the majority of votes, and was elected to a 5-year term and was elected again in 2009, as President of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan.

## Today's Topic of Interest – The Afghan Cabinet

- On 19 Dec 09, President Karzai **nominated 23 people** to become members of the Afghan Cabinet, of a total of 25 posts.
- President Karzai **nominated the same people from the previous Cabinet to fill the key ministries** of: Interior (police), Defense, Finance, Agriculture, Education and Counter Narcotics.
- All nominees **need to be confirmed by the lower house** – in a vote of confidence conducted via secret ballot by the whole elected body.
- Before voting, nominees will have to **justify themselves and take questions** before the whole house.

- Following the **previous nominations in March 2006 reshuffle, 20 were confirmed, 5 were rejected.**
- Parliament voted to dismiss foreign minister Rangin Dadfar Spanta in a no-confidence vote in May 2007, but **Mr. Spanta ignored the move and continues to serve**. His name wasn't on the list submitted on Saturday.
- The **U.S. Embassy in Kabul** said: "We look forward to the lower house of parliament carrying out their duty to vet and approve candidates who will contribute to Afghanistan's progress towards institutional reform, security and prosperity."
- Commentators suggest that at least 5 will be rejected this time, some have even suggest 15 may not be confirmed.
